Membership Report

State President, Honored Guests, and Members.

Membership is one of the most important issues that we face as an organization. Without members we would cease to exist. As an ageing organization we will always lose a certain number of our members each year. This year we added 194 new members to our state, but we have 29 fewer members overall in Utah than we had last year. We lost 223 members because their dues were not paid. Now for some good news, we have 118 candidates statewide waiting to be inducted into our order. In the words of Rick Gathen "Initiate, Initiate Initiate". Last year at the National Convention, Utah received an award for gaining 10 members statewide. If we can go back and initiate our candidates we can be in the positive category, we have a very narrow window to make a difference in those numbers before the National Convention.

So, what can we do to increase our membership? In our state most of the membership chairs are filled by the secretary of the lodge. This makes perfect sense because the Secretary is instrumental in the membership of each Lodge. We all need to step up and help in any way that we can. Each Lodge should have a committee of more than one person dealing with membership. When we have members fail to pay their dues in a timely manner, maybe we should get that member's sponsor to call that member to see what the issue is. If that member will not renew, then we should encourage them to take out a Dimit and be removed from the books.

In our Lodge we have some great people that have volunteered to be committee chairs and have done a great job. But when there is more than one person involved in these events, that committee chair will not be as likely to get burned out planning events. Along those lines don't be afraid to try something new, even if you are told "that will never work". In our Lodge things that were never going to work turned into some of the best events of the year. And those events bring our members to our Lodge, which makes the Lodge money.

This year our Drug Awareness Program and Hoop Shoot committee are planning to combine their presence at the Fairs and community events with a double booth. In this booth we will have some games and activities for the kids. While the kids and parents are at our booth, we will make sure that there are Elks Membership Applications available.

In closing, I would encourage our membership committees to get involved with our Public Relations Committee to communicate all the good we, as Elks, do in our cities and towns. We need to let our neighbors know what "Elks" do in our communities with the grants that are available to us through the ENF. That should help us be able to increase our membership every year. I challenge each Lodge in Utah to have positive membership numbers in the upcoming year.

We received this year from ENF \$111,080...this was for Veterans Volunteers, Most Valuable Student, the Legacy Award, Our State Charity Grant, a Special Projects Grant and the Bonus Grant. That doesn't include the individual lodge grants. We donated \$62,197. This is a ratio of \$1.79 per every dollar we send in!! What a great investment!!

Because of our donations, some of our lodges have received \$42,900 in grants this year to help with their individual lodges...Remember, grants are our money that can help us further our impact and grow our own community!

Right now our State has donated \$53,638.81!!! We have one week left to get our money in...Please please send it as soon as you can to get our numbers up! But...still very impressive!! Our goal is to get to at least \$60,000 every year.

We as a State cannot thank UBET enough! They help us in so many ways from our individual lodges to our State ENF totals! Thank you!!

If you are the ENF chair for your lodge. Please stand up!! Remember these amazing people and help them make their goals also!

Fidelity Club: Ok you have all heard me talk about the Fidelity Club and what and how to become one...if you need additional help, please see me or your ENF Chair from your lodge! To date, we are at 61...we have lost a couple and that happens...but I'm still going to encourage you as ER's and ENF Chairs to get your numbers higher...remember, it comes out of your account, you don't even miss it!!! We have 3762 members in the state and if all donated just \$5 a month that would be: \$18,810 a month and \$225,720 per year! Wow! And all for one soda or coffee a month!

With that said, Some of our Lodges need help! Our per member giving ranges from \$.73 - \$39 Nice job!!! We are not at 0 again this year!!! I know some of you do your big push towards the end and that's great, but I'm going to encourage you to make your push during the year and not wait, if you get donations with your dues, pay them in April or May and be done with it!! It skews the numbers at the end and we need all the help we can get! The more we give, the more we get back! And that's what I love about being an Elk! We do Share and Care!!!

VETERANS COMMITTEE SPRING MEETING MARCH 2024

I see that Mary Croxen has come to the meetings this weekend and I would like her to please stand and be recognized for her many years serving the ELKS as the Utah State Veterans Chair and her service to the Veterans in need in our State. We thank you Mary.

Here are some facts from the U.S. Census Bureau regarding veterans in the State of Utah for your consideration. The veteran population in Utah is estimated to be 143,771. Two-thirds of Utah veterans are at least 55 years old and 44% of those are at least 65 years old. There are 13 VA facilities in Utah and over one fourth of Utah veterans use a VA facility.

Throughout the State of Utah our ELKS Veterans Committees have spent time and money assisting the veterans who live here. In particular, we have given to our veterans who reside in the VA facilities. Funds have gone to the Homes in Ogden, Payson, Salt Lake Medical Center, and the Southern Utah Home in Ivins. We have provided assistance and funding for Birthday Cakes each month, planted flower boxes, fishing trips, birdseed and bird feeders, clothing where needed as well as lots of candy for weekly bingo and many holiday functions.

Our networking with other Veteran Groups and organizations in our communities has benefited veterans in need. I would ask our Exalted Rulers to ask their Veteran Committees to reach out to other groups in their communities which may enhance their knowledge of the veterans who may need assistance. St George #1743 networks with the St George Veterans Coalition, the Rotary Veterans Club, Vietnam Veterans, American Legion, the local DAR Chapter, our city Government, and the Veterans Affairs Southern Utah Outreach Manager. Participating in joint meetings and building relationships has allowed us to help veterans in our community at a more inclusive and individual level.

In 2012 the St George Dixie Elks created a Survivor/Executor Guide to assist in the preparation of the death of a military veteran. During the past two months we have researched and updated this Guide and will be distributing free copies to veterans in the Southern Utah VA Home, veterans in various retirement homes, other VA facilities in southern Utah and of course to veterans in our St George Lodge. Exalted Rulers of our Utah Lodges are welcome to a copy to share with your Veteran Committees as an example of what you might consider as a project. Please see me for a copy and/or assistance.

Since our Fall Meeting at Camp Wapiti in September we have served 1601 veterans at the VA Homes and Medical Center. Volunteers have donated 942 hours valued at \$22 per hour for \$20,724 and driven 3,060 miles @ .52 a mile for \$1,591.20. Well done volunteers.

Currently, we have so much information at our fingertips. Shopping at our fingertips, asking Google or Alexa or Seri for an answer and having it immediately. We carry a computer in our pockets that is more powerful than the guidance computer NASA used for the famous Apollo 11 mission. Ever faster, technology advances at warp speed and computing power grows exponentially.

It's good practice to stay away from suspicious attachments or links. In many cases it is possible to see the source of a link by right-clicking or long-tapping it. If you have any doubt as to the link's origin, this technique may reveal its source. With attachments, carefully examine the email's contents, subject line, and file extension before opening. If there are strange typos or odd extensions on the attached file, it is best to steer clear.
